

In addition to fellowship and fraternalism, you'll find lots of local attractions so you can turn your trip into a family vacation!

Hersheypark

Hersheypark was originally created by Milton Hershey as leisure grounds for employees of his famous chocolate factory. It's now a family amusement and water park on 121 acres. Although



the original chocolate factory is no longer in town, Hershey's Chocolate World still offers a free tour with sweet samples and free parking for up to three hours. You'll find a restaurant, ice cream parlor and

confectionery kitchen, in addition to amusement rides that range from family-friendly to thrilling! Or, you can sit back and relax as you enjoy live shows, including "Our Friends from the Sea" sea lion show.

In 2025, Hersheypark will introduce the Twizzlers Twisted GravityTM, the world's tallest Screamin' Swing, which will defy gravity at speeds reaching 68 MPH.

Antique Automobile Club of America

The Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA) Museum includes many exhibits dedicated to the preservation and presentation of motor vehicle history that will provide education and entertainment for guests. Car buffs may be interested in the museum's Tucker automobile collection, one of the most extensive in the world. They also have a special exhibit of busses, as well as many limited-time displays making every visit unique. Get behind the wheel and participate in the Model T Driving Experience program, where you'll get several hours with an experienced instructor(s) behind the wheels of the museum's Model T Fords.

Memorial Lake State Park

Located only a few miles east of the hotel, Memorial Lake State Park is a great place to enjoy the outdoors. The park sits on 230 acres and is open every day of the year from sunrise to sunset. Take an afternoon hike, enjoy a picnic, ride in a boat or try your luck at


fishing. If you're feeling adventurous, you can get a bird's eye view while hang-gliding high above the park's trees. Trails vary in length and difficulty so you are sure to find one that will fit your needs.



Harrisburg

Just a short trip from the convention hotel is Harrisburg, the Capitol of Pennsylvania. It features an interactive welcome center, special exhibition hall dedicated to the history of the Senate, restaurant and gift shop. Guided tours are available on a limited basis, or you can download the free app to learn more about the Complex's history.

Close to the Complex is the State Museum of Pennsylvania. Explore the exhibits to learn more about the unique contributions and influence that Pennsylvania has made to the nation. You'll also learn more about William Penn, the state's founder. The three level museum features exhibits on: Native American history, the Civil War, industrial and automotive achievements, geology, ecology and Pennsylvania icons.

Meet Me on the War Path*, Jamestown Exposition 1907

HISTORY MTNUTE

On May 14, 1607, Christopher Newport led a group of roughly 100 people to found the first permanent English settlement in North America on the banks of the James River. Three hundred years later the Jamestown Ter-Centennial Exhibition of 1907, a world's fair, was held at Sewell's Point on Hampton Roads, Norfolk, Virginia, to commemorate the event.


Of the many fraternal and social organizations that were invited to establish exhibits at the Jamestown Ter-Centennial, the Traveler's Protective Association was the only one to accept. The Traveler's Protective Association Building was built at the cost of \$9,000 (\$301,155.32 today) and a reception was held there shortly before completion on the Exhibition's official TPA day. Writing of the Exposition, one historian concluded that, "...it is safe to say that few Exposition efforts were

as creditable that was this single fraternal participation."

But the story of the TPA Building did not end there. The United Daughters of the Confederacy gained possession of the structure in 1909 and, shortly thereafter, it was dismantled and moved to Middleburg, Virginia, where it was rechristened Confederate Hall. The building was sold in 1947, and in 1952 it was moved to the back of the lot to make room for a filling station. Once there, it was converted into apartments. In 1972 the structure was then moved for a third time to Hickory Tree Farm, a 304-acre estate located within a mile of Middleburg. Now known as Hickory Tree Hall, it is used as an event venue.

*Cutting through the center of the fairgrounds was a thoroughfare known as "The War Path."

Division Awards

- ➤ Post and Divisions MUST be in 100% compliance with all reporting, including financial statements, bank statements and minutes to receive awards.
- Applications you write into other Posts do not count for awards in your Post.
- > Applications you write into other Divisions do not count for awards in your Division.
- > All applications must be approved by National Headquarters to qualify for incentive awards.
- Individual Sponsors and Posts MUST notify their Division Secretaries when they have qualified for awards.
- ➤ Requests for Individual Sponsor, Post and Division awards must be submitted for review and approval in writing by email or USPS to the CAO from the Division Secretary. The deadline for email or USPS postmark is May 31, 2025.
- > Post and Division Awards will be paid as soon as possible after May 1, 2025.
- ➤ 2025 Convention attendance is required to receive Individual Sponsor Awards. Awards will be paid by July 31, 2025.




Of Hearing This Holiday Season

The Homer T. Wilson Humanitarian Fund

Homer T. Wilson began his association with The Travelers Protective Association of America in 1894 as chaplain of Post J, Fort Worth, Texas. In 1895 he became chaplain of the Texas Division and in 1897 was elected as national chaplain. In 1910 Reverend Wilson became aware of the need to help TPA members in times of need and emergencies. At the national convention in 1910 approval was given for the creation of the Homer T. Wilson Fund, and members voluntarily contributed. The fund was created to help TPA members in need.

Members can apply for emergency financial aid by contacting their post secretary or post president. Requests are then forwarded to the division secretary, who is responsible for verifying that there is true need. The division secretary then forwards a written request to the chief administrative officer of TPA.

Today, contributions are promoted through post and division fundraising, through individual donations, and investment income. If you would like to help fellow members in financial distress, please send your contributions to:

Photo Submission Hints

To help ensure that your photos are the right quality to be printed, here are some helpful photography do's and don'ts for submitting photos to the *Travelers* magazine.

WHEN TAKING PICTURES PLEASE TRY TO:

- Include kids in the picture (if possible).
- · Have people engaging in activities.
- Have people smiling.
- Avoid things that might affect your flash or background (a bright sun in the background, or mirror on a wall, etc.).

- Send original photos from your camera or phone as an attachment to the email.
- Make sure that your camera has the quality of photos on the highest setting.
- Turn off the feature to have the date and time appear on your photo.
- Send more than one photo.
- Send a professional print (if you are unable to send a digital file).

DON'T:

- Embed photos in an email, attach them instead.
- Embed photos in a Word file.
- Embed photos in a PDF file.
- Resize the photos to make them smaller.
- Send photo links from Facebook, or other online sites.
- Send photos from newspapers.
- Print photos from your home printer.
- Use paperclips on photos or write on the back.

Your "Key" to a great family vacation: Pennsylvania

One of the original U.S. colonies, Pennsylvania is full of rich history and culture. The "Keystone State" is waiting for you to come and unlock its many treasurers.

Philadelphia

Philadelphia is famous for more than just cheesesteak! Since colonial days, people have been visiting this timeless city full of history, culture and food. Visit the all-in-one Independence Visitor Center and their box office for free tickets, information on local attractions and public restrooms. Your first must-see stop is the Liberty Bell and Independence Hall. In 1776, Independence Hall is where they signed the

Declaration of Independence and then years later the U.S. Constitution. Visit this national treasure for free, but reservations are required to tour the Hall. Even though it is cracked, the Liberty Bell is still considered one of our country's most iconic symbols of freedom. Located in its own center, you can view the bell, walk through historic exhibits and take a seat in the theater to view a film on the bell's history.

This is considered the start of the "Official Trail of Philadelphia's Historic District," a list of 24 must-see historic landmarks and sites, many of which are free. Along the trail you'll see the Betsy Ross House, the Ben Franklin Museum, Franklin Square and many other historic stops.

The Philadelphia Museum of Art is home to the 72 famous steps that Rocky Balboa ran up in triumph in the Rocky movie. At the stairs you'll find a bronze Rocky statue perfect for a vacation photo. If you like the stairs, you'll love the

museum itself. It's home to more than 240,000 pieces of art including paintings by such famous artists as Renoir, Van Gogh and Picasso.

Just outside of Philadelphia is the Brandywine Battlefield. Explore the 50-acre battlefield





which commemorates the Revolutionary War's largest land battle. View historical exhibits of uniforms, weapons and artifacts found on the battleground. You can view a short film on the battle and its historical significance at the park's visitor center. You'll also get to tour George Washington's headquarters during the battle.

Gettysburg

From its Civil War battlefields to haunted tours and reenactments, Gettysburg is filled with history and a favorite destination among tourists. Start at the Gettysburg National Military Park Museum and Visitor Center to get an overview of the battles and speeches. Tour the many historic buildings located throughout the city, and see the home of the only civilian casualty of the war. As you explore, you'll



see individuals in historic clothes providing tours and demonstrating time-period activities.

The Eisenhower National Historic Site provides a personal look at the home life of Dwight Eisenhower, our 34th President. During his presidency, the home was used for weekend retreats, until Dwight and Mamie Eisenhower retired and moved to the farm in 1961. Enjoy this historic site at your own pace, with a self-guided tour of the home (when open seasonally), its gardens, teahouse, skeet range, putting green and Angus cattle barns.

Downtown Gettysburg has many antique and collectable shops. It also has many excellent



restaurants and craft breweries. Depending on when you visit, be sure to stop and shop the farmers markets where you can purchase produce and fruit grown locally.

Pittsburgh

One of the most iconic skylines in the country, Pittsburgh has attractions for everyone. Nicknamed the "Steel City," it is home to may incredible museums including the Andy Warhol Museum and the Carnegie Science Center and Sports Complex.

During the summer, catch a Pittsburgh Pirates baseball game at PNC Park, where the outfield opens up to a beautiful view of the river and mountains. After the game, catch a ride on one of the city's two inclines. Designed to haul cargo and residents up Mount Washington, these historic inclines are still used by tourists and residents on a daily basis. The breathtaking view from the top of the mountain makes it worth the \$2.50 ticket.

Located in downtown Pittsburgh, the Carnegie Museum of Natural History should top your to-do-list. It is home to 22 million specimens, a testament to the history of Earth's life and evolution. You'll find exhibits of all walks of life, from dinosaurs to Native American exhibits to geology.

You'll also want to visit Pointe State Park, located where the three rivers meet. This National Historic Landmark was the location of Fort Duquesne, which was used during the French and Indian War. Located in the park is the Fort Pitt Museum, which tells the story of western Pennsylvania's role during the French and Indian War, and the American Revolution War.

Take a walk on the wild side at the Pittsburgh Zoo and Aquarium, home to more than 8,000 animals representing over 600 species. Tour through the African Savannah, Forest Passage, Tropical Forest, Jungle Odyssey, Water's Edge and more. In the aquarium, you'll find penguins, stingrays, jellyfish, sea turtles, sharks and fish of every color!

The Great Outdoors

With 124 free, gorgeous state parks that include thousands of campgrounds, 2,000 lakes and more than 86,000 miles of rivers and streams, you can take your pick of activities to enjoy. From the waters of Lake Erie to the rapids at Ohiopyle State Park for whitewater rafting, you'll find the perfect park for your outdoor adventure. Pymatuning State Park is the largest state park in Pennsylvania and with 17,088

The early magazines were 16 pages and were typeset on repro paper with paste-ups done on boards. The boards were submitted to the printer who then created negatives and subsequently plates to be put on the printing press. She'd lovingly adhere the typeset sheets and images to boards using melted wax, carefully arranging the pieces of the puzzle that would become our magazine.

In 1996 Maria converted to not only doing the typesetting, but also the design. The magazine then grew to 24 pages. Now, she changes images and rearranges articles with just clicks of a keyboard and mouse, using design software to produce a print-ready, digital magazine file.

"I have been working with Maria on the magazine for nearly 19 years. She is a gifted designer, and I'm glad to call her my friend," states Christina Knott, TPA Magazine Editor.

acres, it is considered a "must see" state park. Pennsylvania is also home to 229 miles of the famous Appalachian Trail, which spans 14 states.

Rail Trails

Railroads played a key role in Pennsylvania's history. "Rail trails" are paths that follow the long-abandoned tracks of local trains across the state. They're the perfect way to experience the great outdoors and see the state's beautiful scenery.

Located in Altoona, learn about the history of railroads at the Horseshoe Curve National Historic

Landmark. Carved into the mountains known as the Allegheny Ridge, the Horseshoe Curve is considered one of the top engineering marvels of the world. Altoona is also home to the Railroaders Memorial Museum and a historic district with hundreds of buildings from the late 1800s.




